This month in the Ritual Corner I will highlight the 18° of the Chapter Rose Croix. The 15° through the 18° are degrees of the Chapter Rose Croix. As the Lodge of Perfection degrees continue the story introduced in the 3 Blue Lodge degrees, the Chapter Rose Croix degrees cover the time period from the destruction of King Solomon's temple through the rebuilding of the second temple. Let us take a short look into the 18°, Knight of the Rose Croix.

The degree of Knight Rose Croix introduces the duties of practicing virtue that it may produce fruit, the duty of labor to eliminate vice, and the tolerance of the faith and creed of others.

In this degree we are introduced to some important Scottish Rite symbols, such as the rose, the cross, the pelican, the eagle and the pillars. These symbols, when combined with the duties introduced in the degree, contain important information for reflection and help instruct us how to view and conduct our dealings with the rest of humanity. The lessons of faith, hope, and charity, when combined with tolerance, help us improve as men and Masons, and help make the world a better place in which to live.

Join us for the beautiful and informative degrees of the Scottish Rite. Remember, Thursday night is Rite Night!!

Here's a short Q and A about what's going on in Wardrobe:

Q: Where's Tim? And who's the new guy?

A: As is the mark of a great leader, Ill Bro. Tim Dixon, 33° graciously decided to allow others the opportunity to lead and turned over the week-toweek leadership of the Wardrobe Committee to Bro. Thomas Walker, 32° (aka "Brother Juniper") in December of 2015. Ill Bro Tim retains the title of Wardrobe Committee Chair Emeritus and we are always happy when he stops by.

Q: Why am I no longer allowed in the main part of Wardrobe?

A: Many of our degrees have a lot of Wardrobe parts and numerous roles. With actors pulling their own costumes it was becoming increasingly difficult to manage and maneuver. Additionally, actors were "stashing" costumes making inventory control a real challenge. Thus, in May of 2016, the main part of Wardrobe was closed off to all but Wardrobe Committee personnel to help bring order to the chaos.

Q: So how do I get my costume now?

A: A Wardrobe Committee member will pull what you need. This includes swords, crowns, hats and other items. You'll pick them up at one marked window and get dressed. Then upon completion of your role you can get dressed and drop your costume off at the other marked window on your way out. A Committee member will put the costume away for you.

Q: What if I like a specific costume item or have a unique sizing issue?

A: Stop by and talk with us! We can make notes and work with you to ensure that you are comfortable in your role. We also encourage actors and degree directors to stop by in the days before degrees for fittings. It helps us and helps you.

Q: Can I use a costume for a party I have coming up?

A: No! All costumes, their parts and Wardroberelated props must stay at the Minneapolis Scottish Rite and are for Masonic use only.

Q: What other projects are happening in Wardrobe? A: Among our ongoing long-term projects are an update of the costume book, working with the Library Committee on a new computer and role tracking software, looking at new belts and maintenance on costumes and swords, and working with degree directors on inventory and costumes.

Q: How can I join the Committee?

A: Come on up and give us a try! We are always in need of enthusiastic Brothers!

Q: What's the oldest costume we have?

A: The oldest verified costume is from 1938. It is no longer in active degree use.

From the Desk of the Personal Representative Masonic Lost and Found

In June, on a beach in Belize, a woman found a United States Purple Heart metal. The recipient – his name on the back of the metal – is a member of our Valley. Our Brother had loaned the metal to his daughter - an active duty service member - as "something old" for her September 2015 wedding in Belize. The metal went missing that day. It was found, and returned to our Brother.

Last month in St. Paul, a work crew found a 14° Ring buried in the dirt. The ring was presented to a Brother of the Minneapolis Valley in 1924, with his name and date inscribed. A little bit a detective work allowed the ring to be returned to a relative who held our Brother Mason was a dear, cherished memory.

My mother would immediately remind me of one important lesson from these two stories. Put your name on your stuff.

Last fall, a dedicated team of Brothers reached out to members of the Valley who were at risk of losing their membership for non-payment of dues. As a result of their efforts, we "found" over 100 members of the Valley. Another team is at work now, contacting more Brethren and helping them find their way back to the Scottish Rite. I know that their story will have a happy ending.
