From the Building

After the court area came into being due to the remodeling of the dining room, a need for furnishing became evident. In keeping with the antiquity of our building we went in search of tables and chairs that would befit the décor.

Our search was not in vain. On the third floor in one of the small rooms we found just the ticket. Taking a quick inventory we found four tables and fifteen chairs in various states of repair or disrepair depending on how you assessed the situation.

The tables had to be taken apart in order to get them out the door. Unstacking the boxes and robes revealed another fifteen more chairs giving us a total of thirty chairs to work with, what a find!

After getting them down to the new area where they would be used, the cleaning and minor repairs were begun.

What a surprise lay beneath the years of dust and neglect, these tables and chairs were made by hand from the finest white oak. There were some stains--a few water rings, some scratches, a split or two from the wood being dry. Now, what do we do about refinishing?

Let's start with the history, where did these come from? In the center of each tabletop and on the back of each chair is a brass plate which reads, "DEDICATION Class 1920". Three hundred seventy-six men comprised the 1920 Fall and Spring Classes. We believe that both the classes contributed this gift to our Scottish Rite Valley.

A call was made to our historian, Wendy Waszut-Barrett, who informed us not to refinish, "every water ring, every stain, every scratch is a part of the tables and chairs history". The best thing to do is to cover the tables with glass to protect and preserve them.

The chairman of the House Committee has been very adamant about not using them for dining because they are antiques, something about pizza grease, pop can rings and other nasty things that cause stains.

Since the best way to "beat them" is "to join them", so—we made the decision to cover the tables with glass tops. Now we had a plan, so how do we get the money to do it?

York Rite Bodies to the rescue! All the York Rite bodies who meet in our building contributed glass table tops to ensure that no damage occurs to these beautiful tables. All are hopeful that this gift from the 1920 Scottish Rite Class will last another 100 years.

Next time you are in the dining room walk over to the court area and see these tables and chairs for yourself, which are a part of our history here in this building. Then amble over to the long table against the back wall and you will see etched on the glass the names of those who provided the funds for the glass table tops.
