The lesson deals with the beliefs of others. Scottish Rite Masons are not to interfere with the beliefs of others. I think this lesson goes much deeper and let us think of it, for a moment, of being tolerant of ideas.

We have over the history of the United States dealt with religious toleration, one of the founding principles of our country. Over time toleration has taken on other aspects where ethnic toleration was stressed. But is

this enough?

When we think of religious or ethnic toleration aren't we considering differences in sociological, economic, familial, and environmental structures? The backgrounds of our lives and the people who influence us set those structures. We need to be careful as we are admonished in the 30° to not interfere with the beliefs (or I would submit

"opinions") of others.

How would you apply this to your own life and circumstances? All of us, and especially Masons, seem to be individuals of strong opinions. Most of us are willing to go toe-to-toe to defend our opinions. Perhaps we would all be better off in society if we take the time to slow down and listen, being tolerant of what others are saying. That doesn't mean you need to acquiesce or get into some type of raging debate to defend your own opinion.

Be tolerant and enter into civil discourse. Be willing to not only share your opinions, but listen to the opinions of others. We all need to learn from one another. We are obligated to assist and support our Brother. Sometimes, I have found you can both be correct after entering into a civil discussion

and learning from one another.

Albert Pike states about education, "An intelligent people, informed of its rights, will soon come to know its power, and cannot long be oppressed." p. 153) (Morals & Dogma, enlightenment, he states, "Most men have sentiments, but not principles. The former temporary sensations, the latter permanent and controlling impressions of goodness and virtue.....and it is these that Masonry insists upon." (Morals & Dogma, p. 150).
