A reception with a cash bar will follow the Degrees on Thursday, May 12th, and also at the conclusion of the Reunion on Saturday, May 14th. Spouses of Scottish Rite Brethren and the new members are encouraged to attend the receptions.

It has been wonderful to see so many of you joining us to watch the degrees of the Spring class. There have been some fantastic degrees so far, with more yet to come. We are now entering into the Council of Kadosh degrees, and I am looking forward to watching these amazing degrees.

As we venture into the Council degrees, let us look at the 23°, Chief of the Tabernacle. In this degree, we learn the duties of being devoted to God, to endeavor to promote the welfare of man, and to respect and act properly to our superiors. We are taught that a simple faith is wiser than vain philosophy. The 23° is the first degree to introduce the idea of the Mysteries of the ancient civilizations. Albert Pike states, "The instruction now conveyed by books and letters was of old conveyed by symbols; and the priest had to invent or to perpetuate a display of rites and exhibitions, which were not only more attractive to the eye than words, but often to the mind more suggestive and pregnant with meaning." (Morals and Dogma, pg. 354).

By "juice", I mean, of course, all of the knowledge contained in each degree and taught through the ritual, symbolism, and allegories of each. This is tougher than we may initially think!

I've heard some say that each degree is like an onion. You have to peel through each layer of the onion. Each layer exposes an entirely new layer. The problem with this analogy is, it seems to me, that ultimately - after all layers are opened, you are left with nothing but tears! We know that this just isn't true with Masonry!

Our goal should be to take all the juice of the lemon, mix it with a bit of the refreshing purity of water (Masonic research, reading and discussion), and a

healthy dose of the sugar of Brotherly Love, and -- Wow! An indescribable, wholesome and extraordinary sensation! We can now drink deeply of this knowledge and try to quench our thirst! BUT... there is a problem!

After years of trying to squeeze every drop from each chunk, I look back into the bowl and realize that there's still more juice to be extracted! I suppose I should have expected that. After all, I have often been told that what I would get out of Masonry was in direct proportion to the effort I put into it!
