IF WE ARE WHO WE SAY WE ARE

few years back, my lodge was looking at a new project to support victims of domestic abuse. We went back and forth, discussing the pros and cons in setting up this program. I asked PM Steve Saxton what he thought, and he replied, "You know, Tom, if we are who we say we are, we have to do it." That comment has stuck with me over the years.

Who do we say we are? We say that we are good men seeking to become better men. We are certain that we are over the age of majority, of good moral character, with a belief in a Supreme Being — after all, the lodge we each joined verified that by a unanimous vote when our petition was approved.

There are about 10,500 Blue Lodge Masons in Minnesota. Out of those 10,500 Masons, about 2,540 have become Scottish Rite Masons, where we have taken new and more extensive obligations as we advanced from the 4th through 32nd degrees of this Rite. We have been taught the Masonic values of duty, integrity, courage, fidelity, honesty, and tolerance.

We are called to rise to the challenge. The Degrees of the Scottish Rite and the writings of Albert Pike, upon which much of the degree language is taken, identify tolerance as a key virtue of Scottish Rite Freemasonry.

Of the 29 degrees of the Scottish Rite shows that Tolerance is mentioned in 15 of them. The lecture in the 10th Degree of our rite especially admonishes us that we are devoted to the cause of the oppressed

against the oppressor, and of Toleration against Intolerance.

The sad fact is that intolerance is on the rise in our country. In October we observed the one-year anniversary of a shooting at the Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh. During Shabbat morning services at the synagogue, a gunman killed eleven and injured six in what is now the deadliest anti-Semitic attack in American history. But that is in Pittsburgh. Surely here—Minnesota Nice and all—we don't have those issues.

Whoever kindles the flames of intolerance in America is lighting a fire underneath his own home.

Minnesota in general, and Minneapolis in particular, has a long history of anti-Semitism. From the 1930's to the start of World War II, anti-Semitic "Silver Shirts" flourished in Minnesota. It is estimated that in 1936, there were 800 Silver Shirts in Minneapolis, and 6,000 statewide, with a stated purpose of driving Jews from America.

It was extremely difficult for Jewish doctors to practice in the Twin Cities until Mount Sinai Hospital was founded in 1951. But that was in the 30's -40's -50's! Surely, we have come a long way since then!

In February 2017, several anti-Semitic incidents were reported at the University of Minnesota, including the distribution of a flyer promoting a neo-Nazi publication which stated: White Man: Are you sick and tired of the Jews destroying your country?

Swastikas, the symbols that our Greatest Generation sacrificed so much to defeat, routinely end up on private and public property.

Members of the Jewish faith are not the only victims. Two Illinois men, members of a white supremacy group call the White Rabbits, pled guilty to bombing an Islamic Center in Bloomington in 2017 and this November, another mosque was vandalized in Minneapolis.

As Masons, and especially as Scottish Rite Masons, we are duty bound to exercise moral courage, that is, the courage to take action for moral reasons despite the risk of adverse consequences. It is the right thing to do, but it is also a matter of enlightened self-interest. Brother Harold Stassen, youngest person ever elected Governor of has written that Minnesota. "Whoever kindles the flames of intolerance in America is lighting a fire underneath his own home." Brother Samuel Clemons, also known as Mark Twain, has written "It is curious that physical courage should be so common in the world and moral courage so rare."

As Masons and more especially as Scottish Rite Masons, we have vowed to practice moral courage when the situation presents itself. So, if we are who we say we are, we must practice out of the Lodge those great moral lessons which are inculcated in it.

A: For the safety of guests Wardrobe and Make-Up is normally an area that is not shown to visitors. There are too many sharp things that can cause injury if not handled properly. Tours are also discouraged on degree nights due to how busy we get and we don't want someone's first impression of us to be that they are in the way. If you would like to take someone through Wardrobe and Make-Up please make prior arrangements with the Committee Chair.

Q: What interesting things are happening in the near future?

A: The work on updating the degree book continues. As you can imagine with hundreds of roles and costumes it is a long process. Also the old computer from the mid 1990s has had its data downloaded to another form. There are many other changes coming and think you will like them.

Q: Could you make an obscure reference that only one person will get?

A: APRONS ???!!! THIS... IS... SCOTTISH... RITE !!!

APPENDANT BODY CELEBRATIONS

he phrase "appendant body" seems to only be used in conjunction with various Masonic affiliated groups. Membership in an appendant body requires good standing as a 3° Mason. Definitions of appendant include 1. hanging, attached, or adjunct; 2. associated with in a subordinate capacity; or 3. related by cause or purpose; consequent. The Scottish Rite is thereby an appendant body, or herein referred to "appendage", or "arm", of the "body" of Freemasonry. The Council of Kadosh becomes a "hand" of the appendage. And each degree within the Council becomes a "finger" on the hand on the arm of the body. The terminal degree (or "last finger") is key for each hand.

The last finger on the Council of

Kadosh hand, the 30th Degree. It asks us to consider our own mortality and reinforces the lessons of all previous degrees. It also reminds us of the lessons we learned in our symbolic Lodges. This finger also clearly calls out the heroic and

historically significant actions of the Knights Templar and their last Grand Commander, Jacque DeMolay. The Order of DeMolay, our Masonic sponsored male youth group, takes its name from that history. I am a Senior DeMolay. The objective of making good young men better permeates the teachings of the Order of DeMolay.

The degree roles within our last finger echo back to the lessons within DeMolay. The Council of Kadosh has Preceptors (three) in our hand and also in our 30th finger, and in DeMolay ritual there are also Preceptors, each representing a particular virtue. It is fulfilling and reinforcing to reexperience the degrees of our arm within all hands of our Scottish Rite. The inspiration for our Masonic lessons is truly guided by the will of the Great Architect of the Universe.
