## Property / Stage Crew

The Properties Committee/Stage Crew is responsible for the staging of the 29 degrees performed by the Minneapolis Scottish Rite. Among the many things over which we have control:

- Set up chairs and pedestals (putting covers on them as appropriate)
- Put out aprons/collars/jewels, and other items that may be used
- Get the proper drops and wings out on the stage to help set the scene
- Make changes on the floor or on the stage while the degree is being performed.

Most of our work is done behind the scenes, as we try to have the first degree set up before any of the cast members arrive for the night. Often, we only have to make changes between the degrees. We are also responsible for one degree where we make up a room within a room, to help set the mood.

Many of the members of our committee are retired, and so are able to come to the Scottish Rite mid-afternoon each Thursday degrees are performed. They can then take down properties from the previous week (if necessary), and get things ready for that evening. Accordingly, we have an early dinner so that we can complete whatever setup needs to be done before the degree, while the rest of the members and candidates have dinner.

The care and upkeep of all the props is our responsibility. A great deal of our items were created by Brothers who have gone before us, and it has been helpful when our members are able to repair or reconstruct items. We are lucky in that some of the members of our committee are good at figuring out how to build and fix things used at the Rite. Since the Supreme Council has changed how the five mandatory degrees are presented and staged, our members have been able to create new properties for these degrees.

While most of the current members of our committee are able to be present every week, there are some members who are not able to attend every week, due to other commitments. When everyone is present, it makes our scene/degree changes much easier as everyone knows where props belong on the floor, or where they should be returned when it's time to put them away. Because there are three different rooms where our properties are stored, it can take a while to know where to look for something.

Would you like to help create “theatrical magic?” Come be a part of the committee that sets the stage for all the degrees. New committee members are always welcome! It is not necessary to be there as early as some of our retired members, or have a skill to repair things; only that you have an interest in helping out, and attending when your schedule allows. Some nights we stay till the very end of the final degree of the night, as we might have to tear down the stage and floor due to other activities at the Valley before our next degree conferral.

Do you have questions on how to join our committee? Please look for one of our members before a degree or when there is a changeover of degrees. We might be a bit busy then, but would be more than happy to answer your questions after we complete preparations for the next degree.

## Ritual Corner

This month in Ritual Corner I will highlight the 18<sup>th</sup> degree of the Chapter Rose Croix. The 15<sup>th</sup> through the 18<sup>th</sup> degree are degrees of the Chapter Rose Croix. As the Lodge of Perfection degrees continue the story introduced in the 3 Blue Lodge degrees, the Chapter Rose Croix degrees cover the time period from the destruction of King Solomon's temple through the rebuilding of the second temple. Let us take a short look into the 18<sup>th</sup> Degree, Knight of the Rose Croix.

The degree of Knight Rose Croix introduces the duties of practicing virtue that it may produce fruit, the duty of labor to eliminate vice, and the tolerance of the faith and creed of others.

In this degree we are introduced to some important Scottish Rite symbols, such as the rose, the cross, the pelican, the eagle and the pillars. These symbols when combined with the duties introduced in the degree contain important information for reflection and help instruct us how to view and conduct our dealings with the rest of humanity. The lessons of faith, hope, and charity, when combined with tolerance, help us improve as men and Masons, and help make the world a better place in which to live.
